of the Mitcham Stadium as a home ground.

At the outbreak of war, all but one of the playing members entered the Forces and it was not until the 1945/46 season that the Club was re-formed by E. A. Golborn with barely sufficient members for one fifteen. With the added handicap of having to play all games as away fixtures Golborn's task was extremely difficult. Although he only held office for the one season the tremendous amount of work put in by him made the job of his successor, J. B. Pritchard, relatively easy.

The King's College University ground at Mitcham, with its splendid pavilion facilities, was obtained for some home matches, and the Club, although still without a permanent home ground, has indeed established itself in the Rugby world. A reference to last season's results in Club matches and the outstanding success of the two XV's in the Surrey and Staines seven-a-side tournaments proves this beyond doubt.

The first annual dinner was successfully held at the Alexander Hotel, Clapham, in April, 1948, and was attended by 40 members

and guests.

Prospects for the 1949/50 season are exceptionally good. The first fifteen, captained by J. B. Pritchard, and the second under R. Dew, have an imposing list of fixtures. Home matches will again be played at King's College ground and at London University ground at Motspur Park.

The playing members take their football seriously and a Club training night is held every Wednesday in the season at the School. The enthusiasm of the members is most encouraging and under the leadership of J. B. Pritchard one cannot but feel that the Club will

go from success to success.

#### GROUND

A Ground Sub-committee under the chairmanship of R. A. Brown was set up by the Executive Committee of the Rugby Club in June. The question of a ground for the 1950-51 season became critical owing to the sudden notification by London University that the ground at Motspur Park would no longer be available. At that time the Rugby Club had arranged for over twenty "Home Matches" and two months before the commencement of the season no pitch was available. The need for drastic and rapid action was well appreciated.

The sub-committee met frequently and as a first measure approached the Mitcham Borough Council with particular reference to a piece of ground at Colliers Wood which would have been admirable not only for the Rugby Club but for the Association as a whole. Hopes ran high that the Club would obtain this ground especially as the Mayor, as a nominated vice-president of the Association, had been approached and had promised his support in the search for a ground. This ground, however, was allocated to the

club which had used it before the war.

Alternative sites were offered and examined by members of the sub-committee but unfortunately none were suitable for rugby football.

Local councils, sports clubs, the National Playing Fields Association and Rugby Clubs with whom the O.M.R.F.C. are acquainted were approached, the total being upwards of sixty. Apart from isolated but nevertheless much appreciated help from Wallington, Upper Warlingham and Old Whitgiftians R.F. Clubs in permitting the Club the use of their grounds, nothing of a permanent nature was forthcoming.

It was soon realised that the Club could not expect anything in the way of a pitch in Mitcham, despite its connections with the Borough, until such time as the "Canons" is released, which it is believed will be in the 1952-53 season. The main hopes of a permanent local ground rest here.

Finally the Club was fortunate to be granted the use of a pitch on Mitcham Common, near the Red House, by the Mitcham

Conservators, so that all home fixtures have been settled.

The sub-committee has realised the enormous difficulties entailed in obtaining a ground locally which the Club could look on as a real home. At the same time it is deeply conscious of the spirit of the members who are prepared to accept the inconveniences and expenses entailed in virtually travelling away to every match. It is to be hoped that these sacrifices will not have been in vain and that the progress made during the past few years will be main-

tained and even exceeded.

The sub-committee is continuing with its efforts to obtain a ground and these will, in the main, be directed towards the possibility of buying a plot of land for development, which must ultimately be the solution. Land at Esher has already been considered but regretfully rejected as the combined drawbacks of distance and expense were too big an obstacle with the Club at its present stage.


